In re: Law enforcement liability for stops based on immigration status

Recently, there has been wide discussion over the role of local police agencies in assisting U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents in enforcing federal immigration laws. I wanted to take the opportunity to highlight a few areas of concern.

When police officers run a search through criminal data bases, such as NCIC or CLEAN, they may discover that ICE has "flagged" an individual. The fact that an individual has been flagged by ICE does not mean that there is a criminal warrant for the person, and does not provide probable cause to detain or arrest the person. (See Santos v. Frederick Co. Bd. Of Commissioners, 725 F.3d 451 (4th Cir. 2013 (police officers violated 4th Amendment rights of woman arrested on basis of civil immigration detainer)). Unless the information in the database clearly states that there is a judicial warrant for the individual, local police risk civil liability if they detain or arrest the person. ICE detainers are not arrest warrants. Unlike criminal warrants, which are issued by a judicial officer, ICE detainers are issued by ICE itself, without any authorization or oversight by a judge or magisterial district judge.

It should also be noted that because Pennsylvania law enforcement officers are not permitted to independently enforce federal immigration law, they cannot extend the period of an investigatory stop to investigate immigration status, without risking a constitutional violation, since the constitutional duration of an investigatory stop depends on the time reasonably necessary to handle the matter for which the stop was made.


Sir,

Sorry for the delay in getting this information to you. As I said to you on the phone, all of this is kind of like a sales pitch. Recently, the Enforcement and Removal side of Immigration and Customs Enforcement took over most of the liaison work, and police calls from Homeland Security Investigations. In the past, there have been a number of reasons why ICE hasn't been able to respond, or assist local law enforcement. There has been an increased effort in working with other agencies. I have spoken to several Chief of Police Association meetings, and at the SHACOG in the South Hills, ultimately trying to get other law enforcement agencies to give us a call anytime they have an encounter with someone where there is a possible nexus with immigration.

Initially, it began with requesting that officers forward all relevant information to ICE after the encounters. All of the normal stuff: Name, DOB, POB, Address, Vehicle Info, FBI/SID, photos (persons, IDs, vehicles, registration, etc.) I took it one step further and told many local departments that if their officers were comfortable, that they could call me during the stops, especially if they were Spanish speaking. I had 7 years of experience with the Border Patrol in AZ, and my Spanish is good enough to do basic field interviews. In many of these instances, I was able to get relevant information from the subject for the police, as well as ask the necessary questions pertaining to immigration and deportation. It worked out really well for a while.

I was just hoping that with your contacts, I might be able to reach a few more agencies and let them know that we're looking for more work. Dealing with the jails and subjects that are already incarcerated is easy, but we are increasing our efforts to identify, locate, and arrest those that have not yet wound up in the spot light, and that's where local law enforcement comes in. For those that are interested or have information that they would like to pass on, my contact info is below. I'm also happy to answer questions if there are any.

Alcon,

Please review the attached documents. The first two relate to the right of persons to record the actions of police officers. The third is guidance from the District Attorney on dealing with matters of immigration status. The letter clarifies that ICE detainers are not criminal warrants, and cannot be the sole basis for GTPD personnel to arrest or detain individuals. We will continue to provide support and exchange information with ICE personnel, but any arrest or detention made by GTPD must be based on Pennsylvania law.
